Council's Houghton, Habitat for Humanity, Lowe's Team Up for Women Build Week

For her third year in a row, Roughton joined the Lowe's Women Build team to renovate a home in Jurupa Valley. Joining the Women Build team was Maria Lazaro, Habitat partner family who recently purchased a Habitat home one block away and still enjoys volunteering her time revitalize her neighborhood.

Volunteers deconstructed a kitchen to prepare the home new cabinets, counteriops and Energy Star appliances. They repaired stucco, replaced exterior trim, and sealed windows with caulk for energy ef-

Lowe's helped launch National Women Build Week in 2008 and each year provides the support of Lowe's Heroes and conducts howto clinics at stores to teach volunteers construction skills. Lowe's donated \$1.75 million to this year's National Women Build Week, including a \$5,000 store gift card to Habitat for Humanity Riverside, as part of a new five-year partnership with Habitat that will bring Lowe's total contributions to more than \$63 million since 2003.

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dren reside with women heads-ofhousehold. In Riverside County more than 30% of families are in need of affordable housing.

Habitat's Women Build program recruits, educates and inspires women to build and advocate for simple, decent and affordable homes in their communities. Since the program was created in 1998, more than 2,200 homes have been built in partnership with low-income families using Women Build crews. More than 52,000 women from all 50 states have volunt@ered in the six previous Women Build Week events.
